The Kinship and Foster Family Network of Manitoba Training Services Synopsis

Zoom Sessions

Registered participants receive Zoom Protocols prior to training date. Familiarizing yourself with those protocols is important.

During the Covid-19 pandemic KFFNM is providing all the educational, support and training resources which we normally provide through our **Licensed ZOOM rooms**.

We offer opportunities to attend sessions from the comfort of your home. Individuals from all regions of the province are able to connect and discuss similarities and differences with providing care from their home and community.

Due to the nature of the ZOOM process the length of sessions has been reduced. In order to catch missing pieces arising from the shortened session time we have added three mentorship sessions through the nine sessions for Level 1 and added an additional mentorship time to Level 2 sessions.

During Zoom sessions Learning Inventory polls are posted to collect information from participants designed to reflect effectiveness of the material presentation.

Participants are expected to complete a survey following the completion of a training series to support improving the training experience.

Following the completion of a training series participants will receive a confirmation of attendance through an email.

MENTORSHIP SESSIONS

Additional sessions are included in **Level 1** training.

Mentorship sessions are designed to cover or review any material needing more time. As these sessions are less structured they offer opportunities for participants to increase their understanding, share their wisdom, and enhance their connection with others.

Kinship and Foster educational material is proudly developed in the province of Manitoba through KFFNM. Updates reflect current relevant subject material, theories, standards of practice and the input received from participants and CFS agencies.

The Kinship and Foster Family Network of Manitoba is a non-profit organization guided by kinship and foster parent community members.

We thank the kinship and foster parent board members for the expertise they provide in supporting the development of trainings, information sessions and forums. Their guidance and direction is invaluable.

Training Schedules

In order to provide as much flexibility as possible, and reach as many of Manitoba's communities as possible, KFFNM schedules training sessions in Fall, Winter and Spring blocks.

KFFNM training is focused upon skill development for the unique challenges of providing temporary and complementary parent care.

- * Understand system legislation, regulations and standards which impact the provision of kinship and foster care.
- * Understand the responsibility of being complementary and temporary caregivers for children in care.
- * Recognize the importance of exposure to and retention of a child's family culture.
- * Develop skills for supporting restoration for the family of origin.
- * Clarify, demonstrate and communicate the what, why, when, where, and who of the care kinship and foster parents provide.
- * Manage parenting challenges to support the best interests of a child in care.
- * Engage as an effective member of the Child and Family Services team.
- * Work with community resources as a valuable team member.
- * Manage challenges to minimize the impacts of providing care.

PRINCIPLE OF ADDITION

The birth family remains at the center of the circle.
Always add rather than subtract people from a child's life.
Adding people expands the circle of support.
Kinship/foster family can be a valuable complementary addition to the birth family.



This session is designed for individuals interested in providing kinship or foster care. Information provided presents a broad overview of how and why families become involved with the Child and Family Services system. Designed to support understanding of the role kinship/foster parents provide as partners within the Child and Family system.

- Covers care expectations and legislation which governs kinship or foster care.
- Historical impacts of colonization on Indigenous people of Manitoba is discussed to assist with understanding responsibilities in providing care.
- Awareness of multigenerational trauma and the connection to the percentage of Indigenous children in care.
- Focus is on concept of the 'Principle of Addition' to support awareness of the temporary and complementary aspect of kinship and foster care.
- Strengths and challenges of providing care from within a family home are discussed.
- Session provides prospective kinship/foster parents with information to make an informed decision about fostering.
- Information on the licensing process.
- Individual agencies providing their unique Orientation specific to their service mandate is recognized and honoured.

Focused Forums



Each year, our organization invites Manitoba's kinship and foster parents to participate in community forums. Forum topics reflect current concerns regarding providing kinship and foster care.

- Forums are designed to offer kinship and foster parents an opportunity to share their wisdom and express their opinions on the challenges and rewards of kinship and foster parenting.
- It is our hope that the ideas presented in these forums improve the Kinship/Foster Care experience for everyone involved.
- We engage kinship and foster parents across the province to share their thoughts on a variety of topics.
- Forums previously have been held in different regions of Manitoba. Until it is safe, all forums will be held through Zoom sessions allowing individuals to participate in a session which meets their schedule.
- The input from participants at the forums is compiled into a report which is provided across the province to Child and Family Services Authorities, Agencies, forum attendees and made available on our web site.
- Such recommendations, from the collective wisdom of kinship and foster parents, can assist in the development of best practices for Child Welfare in Manitoba.

Information sessions involve both an Information session and a Best Practices session. These sessions are designed to support increased awareness of the complex dynamics involved with providing temporary and complementary care within Child and Family Services. These sessions are currently offered to licensed kinship, foster parents or Places of Safety care providers.

Manitoba CFS Legislation

- Provides an overview of current legislation which governs kinship and foster care.
- General knowledge of the Child and Family Services Act, Regulations and Standards of Practice.
- Participants discuss strategies for working as effective and valuable team members within the CFS system.
- The Best Practice session explores kinship and foster parent roles, responsibilities and rights. (Piloted Winter 2022)

Understanding the Appeal Process for Child Removal

- There are two sessions provided.
- An Information session outlines the detailed process and time lines for the removal of a child from kinship or foster care as set out in legislation.
- Information is provided on the expectations of agencies to investigate allegations and to facilitate an appeal process for kinship and foster parents. Specific time frames set out in legislation are identified.
- The Best Practices session provides opportunities to discuss and explore care practices.

Historical Perspectives

Continuing Impacts of Colonialism on Indigenous Families

- This information is guided by the 94 Calls to Action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.
- Provides awareness of intergenerational historic impacts of settlers and colonization. Understanding the on-going impact of the 60's scoop, residential schools and the Indian Act is discussed.
- Currently kinship and foster care provides a large portion of alternative care for children and their families.
- To support reconciliation and restoration. Kinship and foster parents, are called to be an active part of the solution for the challenges Indigenous families face in the province of Manitoba.
- Calls to action, specific to children in care, are discussed in detail with the hopeful outcome of individual pledges by participants for action steps toward Reconciliation.
- TRC call to Action Responses are explored.
- The Best Practice session explores kinship and foster parent roles with supporting family and community reunification. (Piloted Winter 2022)

Session 7 Teaching Life Skills Zoom Session 2 Hours

Learning Objectives

- ⇒ Understand the importance of clearly presenting parenting strategies, tools and skills.
- ⇒ Clarify the particular life skills they teach child/youth in their care.
- ⇒ Awareness of time lines and when to begin teaching life skills.
- ⇒ Understand the many steps involved in teaching life skills.
- ⇒ Awareness of using the Geography of Support for assessing life skills.

Competencies

- ⇒ Understand importance of adult directed support offered for child.
- ⇒ Awareness of the importance in defining clear life skills being taught and supported by parent.
- ⇒ Awareness for importance of creating a parenting plan/schedule for teaching life skills.
- ⇒ Understanding concrete and operational life skills.
- ⇒ Awareness of differing learning styles a child/youth is most comfortable learning with.
- ⇒ Awareness of recognizing presenting demonstrated skill outcomes.
- ⇒ Understand the Geography of Support for assessing demonstrated life skills.

Session 8 Observing, Recording & Reporting Zoom Session 2 Hours

Learning Objectives

- ⇒ Awareness of skills required for effective parenting observations.
- ⇒ Awareness of recording skills required for developing a history.
- ⇒ Understand effective principles for daily journaling.
- ⇒ Awareness of basic elements for creating assessments.
- ⇒ Understand basic principles involved in writing incident reports.
- ⇒ Awareness of basic recording tools which support monthly reporting.

Competencies

- ⇒ Understand parenting skills for observing behaviours in context, assess and record valuable and factual documentation.
- ⇒ Understand the importance in developing consistent time frames for information collection.
- ⇒ Awareness of the importance of documentation skills in kinship/foster care.
- ⇒ Awareness of the benefits in using tools for documentation.
- ⇒ Awareness of the benefit in creating written plans into parenting strategies.
- ⇒ Understand benefits in writing a history of parenting provided.

Session 9 Fostering Self Care Zoom Session 2 Hours

- ⇒ Awareness of the impact of providing kinship/foster care.
- ⇒ Awareness of the potential impacts of separation and loss within kinship/foster families.
- ⇒ Awareness of the states of change families can experience.
- ⇒ Understand the supports which kinship/foster parents can use to assist themselves and their family.

Competencies

- ⇒ Understand importance in developing family plans, steps and strategies for potential challenges with providing care.
- ⇒ Define aspects of parent/family plans to address potential challenges.
- ⇒ Understand importance in developing support networks in response to kinship/foster isolation.
- ⇒ Awareness of available supports for kinship/foster parents from within their communities.

MENTORSHIP SESSIONS

Mentorship sessions revisit subject matter previously covered providing opportunities for shared thoughts on parenting strategies, tools and skills.

Mentorship sessions are mandatory for full completion of Level 1 training.

Level 2 Sessions

This skill development series builds upon Level 1 series. The focus is on developing skills for communicating and for transferring to others the what, why, how, where, when, and who of the parenting provided.

Using the concepts of parenting strategies, parenting tools and parenting skills: participants develop an overview of the patterns they follow throughout their parenting.

A focus is on participants developing their professional competence with collaterals and the Child and Family Services team.

Continues participant on-going journey to define their Parenting Strategies, Tools & Skills which best describe the uniqueness of their parenting and their parenting best practices.

Fostering Family Connections 4 (2 Hours) Sessions

Learning Objectives

- ⇒ Understand fundamental principles for providing care in Manitoba.
- ⇒ Awareness of causes behind a child entering care.
- ⇒ Understand the importance in first connections with the natural family
- ⇒ Awareness of dynamics involved in co-parenting relationships.
- ⇒ Understand value in preparing for natural family times.
- ⇒ Understand basics and structure for parent to parent journaling.
- ⇒ Understand the importance in using planning tools for natural family interaction.

Competencies

- ⇒ Identify steps for connecting and working with child's natural family.
- ⇒ Define particular co-parenting teaching pattern.
- ⇒ Identify steps for supporting and teaching parenting.
- ⇒ Identify parenting approach modeled and taught.
- ⇒ Identify transferable parenting strategies, tools, and skills taught.

Writing Your Milieu 4 (2 Hours) Sessions

Learning Objectives

- ⇒ Understand the therapeutic value within the parenting wisdom of a strong and healthy foster or kinship home.
- ⇒ Understand the benefit in developing their foster or kinship parenting wisdom into written form.
- ⇒ Consolidate their own unique description of the parenting they provide as developed through level 1 and level 2 participant workbooks.
- ⇒ Create a written framework which best creates a clear presentation of the parenting they provide.
- ⇒ Create a written work which defines the parenting strengths and challenges of their foster or kinship care.

Competencies

- ⇒ Participants share their milieu draft amongst the working group for 'Peer Review'.
- ⇒ Indicate ability to adapt parenting best practices which keep current with providing best practices evolving needs of children and families.

Writing Your Milieu is a Piloted training session planned for 2021/2022 Fall and Winter training Blocks. Participants must have completed all level 1&2 sessions to enroll.

Throughout Level 2 training a variety of parenting books are provided.

The books are designed to be completed cooperatively by child/adolescent and parent.

The development of relationship skills involved are explored at a deeper level in Level 2 sessions.
