Zoom Sessions

Registered participants receive Zoom Protocols prior to training date. Familiarizing yourself with those protocols is important.

At this time, KFFNM continues to provide educational, support and training resources through our **Licensed ZOOM rooms**.

We offer opportunities to attend sessions from the comfort of your home. Individuals from all regions of the province are able to connect and discuss similarities and differences with providing care from their home and community.

Due to the nature of the ZOOM process the length of sessions has been reduced. In order to catch missing pieces arising from the shortened session time we have added two mentorship sessions through the nine sessions for Level 1 and added an additional mentorship time to Level 2 sessions.

During Zoom sessions Learning Inventory polls are posted to collect information from participants designed to reflect effectiveness of the material presentation.

Participants are expected to complete a survey following the completion of a training series to support improving the training experience.

Following the completion of a training series participants will receive a confirmation of attendance through an email.

MENTORSHIP SESSIONS

Additional sessions are included in **Level 1** training.

Mentorship sessions are designed to cover or review any material needing more time. As these sessions are less structured they offer opportunities for participants to increase their understanding, share their wisdom, and enhance their connection with others.

Kinship and Foster educational material is proudly developed in the province of Manitoba through KFFNM.

Updates reflect current relevant subject material, theories, standards of practice and the input received from participants and CFS agencies.

The Kinship and Foster Family Network of Manitoba is a non-profit organization guided by kinship and foster parent community members.

We thank the kinship and foster parent board members for the expertise they provide in supporting the development of trainings, information sessions and forums.

The Kinship & Foster Family Network of Manitoba Training Schedules

In order to provide as much flexibility as possible, and reach as many of Manitoba's communities as possible, KFFNM schedules training sessions in Fall, Winter and Spring blocks.

KFFNM training is focused upon skill development for the unique challenges of providing temporary and complementary parent care.

- * Understand system legislation, regulations and standards which impact the provision of kinship and foster care.
- * Understand the responsibility of being complementary and temporary caregivers for children in care.
- Recognize the importance of exposure to and retention of a child's family culture.
- * Develop skills for supporting restoration for the family of origin.
- * Clarify, demonstrate and communicate the what, why, when, where, and who of the care kinship and foster parents provide.
- * Manage parenting challenges to support the best interests of a child in care.
- * Engage as an effective member of the Child and Family Services team.
- * Work with community resources as a valuable team member.
- * Manage challenges to minimize the impacts of providing care.

PRINCIPLE OF ADDITION

The birth family remains at the center of the circle.

Always add rather than subtract people from a child's life.

Adding people expands the circle of support.

Kinship/foster family can be a valuable complementary addition to the birth family.

Introduction to Kinship/Foster Care

This session is designed for individuals interested in providing kinship or foster care. Information provided presents a broad overview of how and why families become involved with the Child and Family Services system. Designed to support understanding of the role kinship/foster parents provide as partners within the Child and Family system.

- Covers care expectations and legislation which governs kinship or foster care.
- Historical impacts of colonization on Indigenous people of Manitoba is discussed to assist with understanding responsibilities in providing care.
- Awareness of multigenerational trauma and the connection to the percentage of Indigenous children in care.
- Focus is on concept of the 'Principle of Addition' to support awareness of the temporary and complementary aspect of kinship and foster care.
- Strengths and challenges of providing care from within a family home are discussed.
- Session provides prospective kinship/foster parents with information to make an informed decision about fostering.
- Information on the licensing process.
- Individual agencies providing their unique Orientation specific to their service mandate is recognized and honoured.

Focused Forums

- Forums are designed to offer kinship and foster parents an opportunity to share their wisdom and express their opinions on the challenges and rewards of kinship and foster parenting.
- It is our hope that the ideas presented in these forums improve the Kinship/Foster Care experience for everyone involved.
- We engage kinship and foster parents across the province to share their thoughts on a variety of topics.
- Forums are held in different regions of Manitoba.
- Forums are held through Zoom sessions or in-person groups allowing individuals to participate in a session which meets their needs.
- The input from participants at the forums is compiled into a report which is provided across the province to Child and Family Services Authorities, Agencies, forum attendees and made available on our web site. Confidentiality is honored and respected.
- Recommendations, from the voices of kinship and foster parents, can assist in the development of best practices for Child Welfare in Manitoba.

Information Sessions



Information sessions are designed to support increased awareness of the complex dynamics involved with providing temporary and complementary care within Child and Family Services. These sessions are currently offered to licensed kinship, foster parents or Places of Safety care providers.

Manitoba CFS Legislation

- Provides an overview of current legislation which governs kinship and foster care.
- General knowledge of the Child and Family Services Act, Regulations and Standards of Practice.
- Current information for the Act Respecting First Nations, Inuit and Metis children, youth and families is shared and discussed.
- Participants discuss strategies for working as effective and valuable team members within the CFS system.

Kinship/Foster Care Best Practices

- Interactive discussions regarding providing care as kinship or foster providers.
- Topics range from establishing healthy boundaries, what are safe practices, relevant documentation, and how to guide behaviours.
- Participants share and exchange personal best practice strategies.
- Best Practice sessions provide opportunities for discussions and exploration of care practices when parenting children in care.

Historical Perspectives

Continuing Impacts of Colonialism on Indigenous Families

- This information is guided by the 94 Calls to Action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.
- Provides awareness of intergenerational historic impacts of settlers and colonization.
 Understanding the on-going impact of the 60's scoop, residential schools and the Indian Act is discussed.
- Currently kinship and foster care provides a large portion of alternative care for children and their families.
- To support reconciliation and restoration.
 Kinship and foster parents are called to be an active part of the solution for the challenges
 Indigenous families face in the province of Manitoba.
- Calls to action, specific to children in care, are discussed in detail with the hopeful outcome of individual pledges by participants for action steps toward Reconciliation.
- TRC call to Action Responses are explored.
- Discussion on the Act Respecting First Nations, Inuit and Metis children, youth and families and the celebration of the return of the children.

2 MENTORSHIP SESSIONS

Mentorship sessions occur during the first session, prior to module 1, and the second, after module 9. The addition of these sessions combine with the 9 modules to make 11 total sessions.

The first mentorship session is a meet & greet time. It provides Zoom support for participants and a brief over view of the process and the modules to come.

The second mentorship, the last session for Level 1, provides an opportunity for final discussions and sharing.

This skill development series builds upon Level 1 series. Using the concepts of parenting strategies, parenting tools and parenting skills participants develop an awareness of the patterns they follow throughout their parenting.

A focus is on participants developing their professional competence with collaterals and the Child and Family Services team.

The ability to provide a clear and accurate understanding for the care provided in a kinship or foster home is essential when working with CFS agencies, schools, therapists and resources. Not developing this ability may result with others making assumptions and undervaluing the benefit of care being provided.

This 6 module series has been designed to guide participants to communicate their unique parenting approaches, strategies, tools, and skills they use in their home.

The Pilot Course will be offered at KFFNM office. Following the completion of the pilot and evaluation, plans will made to take the course to communities outside of Winnipeg.

- The connecting elements of your parenting.
- Themes which fit your home.

Learning Objectives

- ⇒ Understand the therapeutic value within the parenting wisdom of a strong and healthy foster or kinship home.
- Consolidate their own unique description of the parenting they provide as developed through level 1 and level 2 participant workbooks.
- Create a unique written framework which best creates a clear presentation of the parenting they provide.
- ⇒ Create a written work which defines the parenting strengths and challenges of their foster or kinship care.
- ⇒ Develop skills and competency with sharing the benefits their kinship or foster care provides.

Competencies

Pilot SHARING YOUR COLLECTIVE WISDOM Pilot

These sessions bring kinship and foster parents together to openly discuss what they have learnt through experiences of providing care from their home. Only they can truly share the strengths and challenges they have faced. Person to person to person support is a valuable benefit for all involved.

We are inviting kinship and foster parents to join us for our **IN-PERSON** supported chat sessions.

We will be holding these sessions once a month in our office. They will be facilitated sessions with topics that are relevant to your journey as Kinship/ Foster Parents.

They are designed to give K/F parents an opportunity to ask questions, discuss concerns, share your experiences (what works, what didn't) which you have found had a positive impact for your family and the children/youth that you care for.

We look forward to participants suggesting new topics to discuss.

These will be 2 hour sessions. Participants will receive a certificate of attendance.

This program will be offered in communities after the pilot evaluation.

We will begin discussing topics such as:
